Kid Detective Sherlock Sam and Robot Sidekick Watson Solve Mysteries Around Singapore

Award-winning children's book authors Adeline Foo of *The Diary of Amos Lee* and Emily Lim of *Prince Bear and Pauper Bear* are among the adults who have been won over by the first book of this new series, calling the boy-and-robot team "one of Singapore's favourite detective duos". Nine-year-old Tessa Foo attests to wanting to eat the Peranakan dish *ayam buah keluak* featured in the first title *Sherlock Sam and the Missing Heirloom in Katong* after reading the book, calling Sherlock Sam and Watson "really cool" while nine-year-old Matthew Goh says, "You simply won't be able to bring yourself to put the book down!"


How did this food-loving Singaporean boy-and-robot detective duo get created? Written by husband-and-wife team A. J. Low, the idea was conceptualised by Epigram Books.

"For the character of Sherlock, we put a little bit of ourselves into him—he's a comic book fan, he loves science and mysteries and most of all he loves his family and friends.

... in the first draft of the book, Watson the robot didn't exist! But Felicia had always wanted to write a book with a robot in it and we developed the idea of this cranky robot together!" -A. J. Low

Apart from intense debates between husband and wife, which strengthened the story and characters' development, the pair spent much time doing valuable research by eating lots of Peranakan food. The duo share an ethos of quality writing for children, and the characters of Sherlock Sam and Watson often banter with a grown-up wit and razor-sharp humour that will make children and adults laugh.

Jimmy grinned widely. "We should get a *batik* shirt for Watson too! His can have cool robots on it!"



"Sherlock-did-not-give-me-clothing," Watson said.

"Why would you need clothing? You're a robot!" I said

"Clothing on robots is cool. Robots on clothing is cooler," Watson replied.

Illustrated by freelance illustrator and artist drewscape (Andrew Tan) who brings the story and its characters to life with a suitably quirky, bold and winsome style, the series is set to win the hearts of many more readers both young and old. *Sherlock Sam and the Missing Heirloom in Katong* will be available at all good bookstores in end-January. Look out for the next title in the series **Sherlock Sam and the Ghostly Moans in Fort Canning**, to be published in March.

Apart from a series of bookstore appearances, the authors will also be leading a writing workshop for children on 'Creating a Convincing Villain' at The Arts House on Saturday 23 March at 11am as part of The Arts House 9th Anniversary celebrations.

In reaching out to young readers, Epigram Books has collaborated with design company Brick by Brick to create the first-ever LEGO® model of a character from a Singaporean publication. An engineer, Sherlock's dad is a scientific genius, but is rather forgetful and bumbling in real life. He has never stopped reading superhero comics—a love he's passed on to his son.



A homemaker, Sherlock's mom is half-Peranakan and is constantly experimenting in the kitchen. Sherlock often wonders why she tempts him with food, then does not allow him to eat his fill.



A Peranakan matriarch, Auntie Kim Lian is renowned for her cooking skills. Fiercely protective of her grandchildren and her family recipes, she loves cooking for Sherlock Sam because he loves her food!
